

"If God wants me to be thankful for vegetables, why did He make them taste like vegetables?"

Hi folks,

As we continue to think about how we connect with our community, and serve God here, how we encourage out young people in faith, as well as the every present concern about numbers, a much used verse springs to mind. Indeed I myself have quoted it often...Jeremiah 29:11-14 NIV "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. (12) Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you. (13) You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart. (14) I will be found by you," declares the LORD,

The first part is oft quoted and we focus on the positive plans God has for us, looking forward to them coming to fruition. Practical things, and although he is behind them, earthly things, people, events, numbers etc.

But notice the next verses – notice the basis of the plans, the first step "Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you. (13) You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart. (14) I will be found by you,"

The very first part of his wonderful plan is not about what he will do for us in practical terms, not about when it will happen, but in fact about deepening our relationship with him.

He is speaking to a people who were about to go into exile, because they had left God out of their plans, messed around with other Gods, and forgotten in their dealing with one another that each was loved by God – Justice had gone out the window.

The news that they have gone too far, and consequences are to follow is followed by promise of his presence even during the exile, and relief and restoration to come.

They are looking for when he will give their land back to them. But He is looking at a plan in which first they come back to him in spirit..

I hope we have not fallen away like the people in Jeremiah's day, but all the same, God's plan for us begins in the same place. Our concerns may be practical, but to God they are secondary behind the most important things for his church - knowing him more and more deeply, calling upon him, seeking him in prayer, fasting (those who are able and willing), seeking to know him more deeply, be more moulded into his image.

And the rest will follow. Plans to prosper us in his work, to share the depths of his love with all who will receive, to reflect God's wonderful generosity, to spread Godly joy and laughter, to live in "knowing him" so openly that others "want some of what they've got".

Let us call upon God to do his thing within us, and then in our neighbourhood.

God turns up at the BAFTAs - by Justin Brierly.

'I believe in God.'

Those words made me sit up and listen when they were uttered by Samantha Morton during her acceptance speech for the BAFTA fellowship award on Sunday night.

Morton, who has starred in blockbusters such as *Minority Report* and *Fantastic Beasts*, also directed the 2009 movie *Unloved*, which she said was about 'faith, hope and forgiveness'.

Morton is a committed Catholic. And she's not the only celebrity who has been willing to share their faith from a public platform.

A few years ago, Hollywood actor Chris Pratt shared his Christian faith during an MTV awards ceremony, saying 'God is real. God loves you. God wants the best for you. Believe that.' Likewise England football player Bukayo Saka frequently gives thanks to God in post-match press conferences.

This increasing willingness among public figures to talk about their faith marks a change in the spiritual atmosphere in recent years. During the height of so-called 'New Atheism' in the mid-2000s, it was rather unfashionable to admit you believed in God. Bestselling atheists like Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitchens were pouring scorn on anybody who admitted to having a faith.

So, what's changed?

In part, the new atheist movement itself became over-zealous and shouty. But, it also turns out you can't eradicate the religious impulse. Indeed, even in our very secular age, I'm surprised by how many thinking people are converting to Christian faith.

One of them is Paul Kingsnorth, a celebrated writer and poet, who surprised his audience by announcing his conversion in 2021. Speaking on my <u>Surprising Rebirth</u> podcast, Kingsnorth explained why he believes many people are waking up to the need for God, saying that the search for the divine 'has always been at the centre of every culture... except this one... which has decided to pretend that's not real for a bit.'

Another high-profile thinker reminding secular people about God is the historian Tom Holland, co-host of the hugely popular *The Rest Is History* podcast. I trace Holland's own intellectual and spiritual journey in my book *The Surprising Rebirth Of Belief In God*.

Holland is among a number of secular thinkers who are reconsidering the value of Christianity in the wake of new atheism's collapse and the growth of a 'meaning crisis' in our culture.

Whether God gets celebrity endorsements or not, I think the tide is turning in our post-Christian culture. Think about your everyday life – you might just be surprised where God turns up next.
